

The People We Meet


In the course of writing FARM SHOW stories for 35 years I've dealt with thousands of the most interesting people you'll ever meet. Our focus is always on the ideas so we don't very often tell stories about the people. But one fellow we met recently has had such an unusual life I thought maybe I'd pass his story along briefly.

Jim Tessier makes detailed models of farm equipment from aluminum cans (see his story on page 6). It's not an accident that he turned a hobby into a sideline business because he spent many years in isolation, working for 17 years as a government contractor on Johnston Atol, an island 2 miles long and 3/4 mile wide, located 800 miles southwest of Hawaii. His top secret job on the atol was destroying outdated nuclear weapons from the U.S. and other Allied countries. He and a small crew of specialists worked on the island, toiling 12 hrs. a day, 7 days a week for 2 mos. and then getting 2 weeks off in Hawaii. He had the same routine for 17 years, and made 2 1/2 times normal wages, which he was able to sock away because the government supplied his housing and food. The only money he spent was in Hawaii 6 times a year. While on the island, he started making things from pop cans to pass the time. Once all the weapons they were dealing with had been eliminated, the U.S. destroyed all its equipment and tore down the plant. All that's left on the island is a runway to land tourist jets 3 times a week. And a pretty good story.
