Randomly selected farmers "tell it like it is" in nominating their "best" and "worst" buys.

Mark Jacobs Associate Editor Don Hermes, Oxford, Neb.: "So much for the new Chrysler Corp." says Don, upset with his 1984 Dodge D-150 pickup. "Gear shift lever had to be bent to get it in reverse and the transmission had a scraping noise and too much backlash. No vent in rear axle housing caused leaks and pinched wires caused electrical trouble in cold weather. The 318 engine takes more gas and has less power than 1972 model."

Jerome Welters, Sarcoxie, Mo.: "My Miller model 12 front end loader is a best buy. This quick-tach loader holds up well under all the strain and pressure that my 1850 Oliver 4-WD can produce. It's heavy built and you can take it off and on in less than 5 minutes. Mounts to the tractor in 3 locations, yet has only one disconnect point."

Dorothea Paul, Morton, Minn.: "I bought a slightly used International 5488. The fuel consumption is really good even in the toughest plowing. For the 195 hp., the tractor is easy to handle, even for row crop cultivation. The cab couldn't be more comfortable. All around, I like the components better than the 5088 I'd owned before."

Robert D. Sperstad, Stoughton, Wis.: "My 1985 Chevrolet El Camino started easy all winter and handles real well. Gets terrific mileage with its V-6 automatic overdrive."

"My 1985 Ford 7710 with front wheel
assist had several problems that the
dealer took care of but a new tractor
shouldn't have this many things go
wrong. The engine had oversize valves in standard guides, the load
monitor had to be replaced and both
rear wheel seals and one front seal
leaked."

As "best buy" Keith nominates his New Holland 855 round baler. "There's never any problem starting a bale. Makes a good, solid bale."

Bernhard Neuman, Athens, Ill.: "This device, made by B.E. Myers Inc., is equipped to drive pests (mice, etc.) away. I have mice in the house so I put it in the pantry. It has no effect on pests," says Bernhard, unhappy with his "sonic and ultra-sonic electronic pest repeller."

John Duncan, Leask, Sask.: "It makes a hard starting diesel engine work even in the coldest weather," says John, happy with his "Hot Box" gas fired engine heater that circulates hot water through the engine and warms the oil pan with exhaust. "Even a 350 Cummins engine starts in -30°C after turning the switch on for 30 to 40 minutes. Saves costly repair bills on the starter and saves batteries and time."

B. Kraemer, Sheldon, Mo.: "I almost had to give it back to the dealer to get rid of it," says Kraemer unhappy with his "worst buy" Murray tiller. "It was no good. The tines were out of time and couldn't be changed unless you cut them apart and rewelded them on. The gear box leaked grease and the motor took a fill of oil for each tank of gas."

He's had better luck with his Roto-Hoe rear tine tiller. "It's a good machine so it will till by itself. All you need to do is guide it a little bit."

Marvin Kurt, Cascade, Iowa: "This was our first and last Chrylser product," says Marvin, upset with his 1984 E Class car. "E.P. rating was 22/35. We drive 60 highway miles a day and the best mileage we get is

one of the worst saws I've ever had.

As "worst buy" he nominates his Majestic add-on furnace. "We spent a lot of money to add it to our gas furnace and we never could really get any heat out of it. I didn't get one bit of help from the company on how to make it work. Finally, we had the expense of taking it off our gas furnace. We could have paid a lot of gas bills with all the money we wasted on it."

John Weber, Fowler, Kan.: "I had a flat tire two different times on my 116 Deere lawn tractor. First, I just aired it up and kept mowing. It went flat again, so I pumped in some Rubber-
