
"It brings the warmth and romance of a campfire to your backyard," says Paul Hile, manufacturer of the Scandinavian woodfire ring called "the Brola".

Built to withstand the high temperatures of a raging wood fire, it's made of heavy iron (11 ga.) and measures 27 in. in dia. Comes with a built in 3-way vent (for complete combustion and to drain out rainwater), and an expanded metal cooking grill that covers half of the top surface.

"According to legend, the Brola was carried for generations by migrating Norsk herders with one ongoing fire serving as a place to warm, eat, talk and reflect. Originially, it was made of special stone. Over the generations, stone gave way to iron but the function and purpose have remained unchanged." Hile points out.

Sells for \$185. Weighs 41.5 lbs. and carries a lifetime warranty.

KEEPS ROPE FROM TANGLING

"Pet Pole" Frees Up Tethered Dogs

"Dogs love it," says the manufacturer of a new "pet pole" for dogs that gives free movement over a 360° area, eliminating problems with tangled ropes or chains.

The new Liberty Leash consists of a super strong bendable nylon-fiberglass swivel pole and a long length of woven steel cable. You stake the base of the pole securely to the ground and attach the free end of the cable to the dog's collar.

"When a dog is tied to a regular rope or chain leash, he gets jerked back hard when he runs to the end of it, and often the rope ends up between his legs. When he reaches the end of the Liberty Leash, the pole begins to bend, signaling to the animal that he can't go any further," says manufacturer Red Robbins of the Robbins-Terry Co.

The leash comes in both light and heavy models for dogs up to 40 or 125 lbs., respectively. Both models give the dog a 24 ft. dia. circle of movement and sell for \$29.95.

New "Cordless" Iron

"Our new cordless iron was designed for the Amish and others who live without electricity but we've had tremendous interest from nearly everyone who's had a look atit," says Galen Lehman of Lehman Hardware & Appliances, Inc., Kidron, Ohio, a company that specializes in gas-powered lights, refrigerators, and other appliances.

Lehman's new cordless iron heats up in seconds with butane gas stored in a built-in tank. Because no electricity is required, there's been a lot of interest from recreational vehicle owners as well as from people who frequently travel to other countries that have different electrical systems. "Many housewives tell us they like the idea of not having a cord that tangles up and of not having to hunt for an electrical outlet each time they iron," points out Lehman.

A built-in electronic ignitor - powered by a long-lasting 9-volt battery - lights the gasfired iron with the push of a single button. Once lit, a twist knob controls the temperature as on any electric iron. The iron burns



steadily, even when held upside down. The non-stick, teflon-coated surface can reach temperatures of several hundred degrees, if needed.

The built-in gas tank takes about 15 min. to fill with a charge that lasts from 45 min. to 2 hrs.; depending on the setting. A 5.65 oz. butane canister, that sells for about \$2, will fill the iron four to five times. The iron sells for \$66.95.

First-Of-Its-Kind Hoe

"It's the most exciting new garden tool in years," says Patricia Weitekamp of Weitekamp Tools Inc., manufacturers of the new "Seed Row Pro" garden hoe that's uniquely designed to both open and close seed rows in addition to performing other chores around the yard and garden,

The triangular-shaped hoe is pulled backwards through the soil to form triangular seed furrows. To close a row, you turn the hoe over. The top plate levels the top of the row, lightly packing the seed. Two "wings" leave shallow furrows on either side of the row to collect moisture.

"It eliminates the need to bend over to close the row and does a better, more consistent job which results in better emergence and yields," says Weitekamp, noting that once the plants come up, you can use the new hoe for weeding. The lightweight hoe (wefghs just 2 lbs.) can also be used to dig weeds out of a lawn and to edge sidewalks and driveways.
