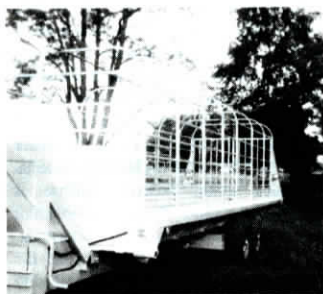
Bale Hauler Converts To Livestock Trailer

"It's the Cadillac of bale haulers," says Myron Horton, farmer and manufacturer of the Roadrunner bale hauler that converts to a livestock trailer or flatbed when not needed to haul bales.

The Roadrunner hauls 5 bales and has its own motor and battery to drive an unloading chain that unloads the bales back onto the ground in the same way they were picked up. This, Horton says, helps bales retain their moisture seal. A hydraulic-powered version for use behind tractors is also available, and self-loading bale arms can be installed as an option on hydraulic models. It can be fitted with both gooseneck and straight hitches.

Quick-connect attachments convert the bale transporter into a flatbed utility trailer. Removable steel panels can then be inserted into receiving slots in the bed to convert the flatbed to a sturdy 20 by 5 1/2 ft. livestock trailer.

A 26-ft. model with straight hitch and

tandem axles sells for \$3,695. Horton has established a dealer network throughout several states.

SLIPS OVER THE TOP OF ANY TIRE

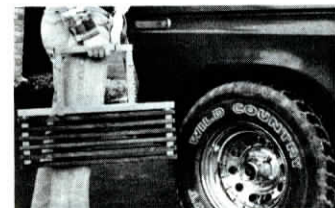
Handy Mechanic's Step

USES A 48-IN. DIA. PROPELLER

"Propstickle" Runs Up To 50 Mph On Air

You've never seen anything like the propeller-driven "propstickle" built by a California inventor when a friend challenged him to "do something creative" with a used 12-hp. Kohler engine.

Jim Riordan, San Jose, Calif., says his creation's top speed is 50 mph. Built around the frame of a small Yamaha cycle, the air-driven scooter can carry two passengers. It weighs a total of about 260 lbs. and has a 1 1/2 gal. fuel tank. The 48-in. dia. airplane-

type propeller is belt-driven by a side-by-side pair of V-belts. Each of the rear wheels has independent suspension and drum brakes salvaged from a Honda cycle.

Riordan says the most critical part of the design was figuring out where to position the engine because the cycle had to be balanced when starting out. As it turns out, unlike most cycles which rise up with acceleration, Riordan's air-powered cycle actually goes down as it accelerates.

"People Hauler" For Pickups

Six adults can ride comfortable in the new "people hauler" for pickups introduced by Cover-Up Industries, Cedar Falls, Iowa.

"It also doubles as a low-cost sleeper for camping," says Jim Ayres, president. "Just fold out the seats, set your Coleman stove in back and you can go camping just like the big boys — for a lot less money."

The fold-down and slide-in seats are carpeted and fitted with high density foam cushions.

Complete package, with topper, seats and rear door, sells for \$1,500. If you already have a topper, you can buy the seat assembly for \$325. Fits all size pickups and comes in a variety of colors to match your pickup.
