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Watch Out For This **Internet "Tractor Scam"**

According to a recent story by Sam Moore in the Farm And Dairy newspaper, last April he placed an ad at an internet website called www.YesterdaysTractor.com. He was asking \$3,200 for two Graham-Bradley tractors. Email responses started to come in almost immediately.

One of them said, "Good day. My name is Paul Roundy. I help in the procurement of tractors on behalf of my numerous customers. I have a customer who is interested in purchasing your two Graham-Bradley tractors, for the amount of \$3,200. The payment for the tractors will be remitted by a cashiers check. Pickup will be arranged after you confirm payment. Kindly reply to confirm your interest in selling the tractors to my client.

Moore replied and then received another message: "My client will be sending you a check for \$6,000. You will deduct \$3,200 for the tractors and send the balance to the shipping company that will arrange for shipment of the tractors.

Moore stopped responding at this point because he had received two other similar emails from people who also didn't seem to be too interested in the condition of the tractors. They both suggested the same method of payment. He did some more research and found out that this is a common scam running on the internet.

The idea is that they send you a check for more than the amount of whatever is for sale, and then ask you to send the difference to their shipper. That makes you feel like they trust you. What they actually do is send you a counterfeit cashier's check, which you deposit in your account. Then you send a check to them, via the supposed shipper. By the time your bank discovers the check is counterfeit, your own check has reached the scammer and, in the case above, you would be out \$3,700.

So if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Moore eventually sold his tractor to a bona fide collector and got his money.

Thieves Swipe Siding Off Shed

Crime is getting pretty bad when thieves start stealing the siding off farm sheds. That's exactly what happened last summer to Fred Cook of Tilbury, Ontario. He could barely believe his eyes when he saw his stripped-down shed.

On Aug. 28, Fred and his son Scott discovered that the 14ft. wide sheets of steel siding had been removed from their 20-year-old shed

They figure the thieves came in the middle of the night and that it would have taken four men a couple of hours to do the job. "There were 780 screws removed, and not one of them was left on the ground," says Scott.

The steel was worth nearly \$1,400, he says. The family's insurance company has agreed to cover the cost under its "malicious act" criteria, less the deductible.

It wasn't so much the money or the time it will take to replace the siding that bothers the Cooks. "Can't we be left alone? We have enough problems with the weather and the government," says Fred, who adds that the theft of steel siding surprised both their insurance company representative and the local police. Pickup Reaches 1.7 Million Miles

I had an interesting call from a reader the other day. Terry Binder from Pittsville, Wis., wanted to tell FARM SHOW about his 1989 Dodge pickup with more than 1,780,000 miles on it. The pickup has a 5.9 liter diesel engine.

Over the years we've featured some pretty amazing cars and trucks, some with over 1 million miles. But this was carrying things to a new level. We asked for more details.

Terry told us he delivers flatbed trailers around the U.S. so he's on the road much of the time. In 15 years of use, he says he's only had to replace two sets of ball joints and two sets of exhaust. He replaces the brakes every 250,000 miles and he puts on new tires every 40,000 miles.

Terry washes his truck several times a week because he thinks a clean truck "just runs better". In fact, he says he probably could have bought a new truck for all the money he's spent on washing. But he seriously thinks it makes a big difference

Most surprising of all was that he said he only changes oil every 30,000 miles. "I use Mobile Delvac oil, which is a severe-duty synthetic oil that's more commonly used in overthe-road trucks. I also use it in all my tractors, my wife's Ford Taurus (240,000 miles) and even a push lawn mower that I bought for \$59 and have used for 22 years, changing oil just once. It still starts right up with one pull.'

In tractors, Terry says he usually goes around 700 hrs. between changes. He runs an oil analysis at about 350 hrs. and says it always tells him there's no point in changing oil that soon.

Terry's truck has only a tiny bit of rust on the box. Otherwise, it looks like new.

He recently gave the high-mileage truck to a friend and bought a new Dodge, also with a 5.9 diesel. He did it to get the premium seats that are available on newer models.
