Go-Anywhere Wheelchair

Anthony Thiel, who lives near Boston, N.Y., is a quadriplegic who stays as active as he can. He recently sent me a note about modifications he made to his battery-powered wheelchair.

"I got hurt in 1990 when the transport wheels kicked out from underneath a Deere hay elevator. I wanted to keep helping on the vegetable fields a quarter mile from our house. But the power chairs I tried couldn't handle the terrain.

"I finally bought an Invacare wheelchair. It was originally equipped with 8-in. high, 2 1/2-in. wide front wheels which bogged down on soft plowed ground. I had them replaced with larger 10-in. tall, 3-in. wide wheels which float easily over rough ground. I also removed the anti-tip wheels on back of the wheelchair because they were digging into the dirt, causing me to lose traction. A mechanic friend lowered the wheelchair seat and moved it forward. As a result the wheels are now farther back so I can go up steep inclines without tipping backward.

"I had four rings welded to my chair - two on each side - to use to tie the chair down while being transported. I also tow a wagon using a light chain hooked onto one of the rear rings. There's a cargo box and two buckets on the wagon to haul stuff. An aide is with me 24 hours a day and she hooks up the wagon and fills the buckets."

Using Acetone To Boost MPG

A hot topic on the internet lately is using acetone to boost gas or diesel mileage. There seems to be lots of evidence the idea works but there are a few things to watch out for. Here's what we've been able to find out.

Acetone is the main ingredient in paint thinner and fingernail polish remover. You want to make sure you use 100 percent pure acetone (available at drugstores). But you must be careful since it's very flammable if stored improperly, and it'll take the paint off your vehicle if you're not careful when pouring it into the tank. It's also very important to know your vehicle since acetone can wear away plastic components. Most fuel systems are made of higher quality components but some problems have been reported on a few vehicles.

Added to fuel in small amounts, acetone aids in the vaporization of gasoline or diesel, increasing fuel efficiency, engine longevity, and performance. Use 1 to 3 oz. of pure acetone per 10 gal. of gasoline. In a 10-gal. tank of diesel, use from 1 to 2 oz. of acetone. Reports of mileage increases of 25 percent or more are common.

Massey's Biggest Tractor Ever

Massey Ferguson plans to start selling its most powerful tractor ever in 2009. Built at AGCO's factory in Beauvais, France, the big tractor will have a 365 hp 6-cyl. engine, a stepless transmission, integrated front linkage and pto, and a new 4-pillar cab. Sixteen test units are in the field this year.

The tractor was introduced at an event held recently to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Massey Ferguson name. Massey-Harris bought out Harry Ferguson in 1953 but the name "Massey Ferguson" wasn't used until 1958.

Pigeon King Goes Belly Up

Pigeon King International, the Canadian outfit that promoted pigeon breeding to hundreds of investors across North America, declared bankruptcy in June, according to *Better Farming* magazine, the publication that first exposed the business as a classic Ponzi scheme. At one point, Pigeon King was selling breeding pairs for as much as \$500. More than 1,000 farmers got involved, with some investing as much as \$1 million. Hypermilers Get 100 Mpg - Or More!

Wayne Gerdes is the Lance Armstrong of gas mileage. He's one of a growing number of "hypermilers", drivers dedicated to extracting the maximum mpg possible from every tank of gas. Gerdes gained notoriety in 2006 when he and his team traveled 2,254 miles on a single 13.7-gal. tank of gas. They were driving a hybrid Honda Insight at a competition in

Tonkawa, Oklahoma. That was an average of 165 mpg in a vehicle with an EPA rating of 66 mpg highway. For the competition, Gerdes used techniques that might be illegal on the street - such as removing power steering pumps, cutting away side mirrors, and shutting off the engine while coasting - but he says many of the fuel-saving techniques he and other hypermilers have come up with could boost mileage in any vehicle - often as high as 100 mpg. He started a website called www.CleanMpg.com which is a forum for fuel-saving pennypinchers. Another mileage-saving website worth checking out is www.GasSavers.org.

Remember Lurch?

If you thought the horns on Lurch the Watusi steer were big when he first got into the Guinness Book of World records (Vol. 27, No. 6), take a look at him now! Lurch is owned by Janis Wolf of Gassville, Ark.



With 38-in. dia. horns, Lurch has now beaten his own world record.

Watusi cattle, which originated in Africa, are known for their big horns. Lurch was born in 1995 and it soon became evident his horns were going to be big even for a Watusi. Wolf thought they had stopped growing in 2003 when she submitted Lurch's measurements to the Guinness people. At 37 1/2 in. dia., he easily beat the previous record. However, in the past 5 years, the horns have continued to grow. Today they measure 38 in. around and 7 ft., 6 in. from tip to tip.
