

Heavy Crop Buckles Bins, Augers

Contributing editor Janis Schole reports a conversation she recently had with Roger Gutschmidt, who farms near Fredonia, N.Dak. Apparently there have been numerous problems in his area this year with heavierthan-normal wheat. Hard Red Spring Wheat has been reported at weights of 64 to 67 lbs. per bushel, compared to historical averages of anywhere from 55 to 60 lbs. per bushel. The heavier crop, due both to better

varieties and this year's crop conditions, is damaging augers, trucks and bins. Gutschmidt says the unloading auger on his Deere combine got a "kink" in it from the heavy wheat. He's in the process of repairing it with a reinforcing auger sleeve he made to fit over it, and he's also installing an extra transport cradle (look for a story on that in the next issue). Roger also sent us a picture of an 80,000 bu. bin in Fredonia that recently buckled due to the heavy wheat. He says the sidewalls of the bin were just not strong enough for the current crop. He has also heard of truck hoists not being able to lift loads of wheat, with frames twisting, axles snapping, and tires blowing out. According to Gutschmidt, one of the top-producing wheat varieties that especially tipped the scales this year is called "Glenn". "An elevator manager told me that it's the best and nicest looking wheat they've ever had come in," he says.

Dan Sabo: "Your bird is a cross between a Rhode Island Red rooster and a Golden Polish hen.'

Greg Schiebout: "It's a Hamburg chicken. It flies like a pheasant, so maybe that's where the confusion started."

My birds are various colors. Some are black and look like starlings when they are little. I bought the hatching eggs from an Arkansas breeder."

New Holland's new combine has a 523 hp engine

The first was the company's gigantic new 523 hp. CR9080 Twin Rotor combine, which the company says is now the largest combine in North America. In addition to more horsepower, it also features the largest threshing capacity, cleaning area, and cab (110 cu. ft.).

Another exhibit celebrated the company's 35th anniversary of skid steer production. They've released a limited edition skid steer that looks like the company's first model built in 1972. It has roughly the same capacity but with updated hydraulics and electronics. What struck Jim was a small data sheet comparing the original machine to this modernday replica. Although the machines have roughly the same lift capacity, the price has increased more than 6 times in the 35 years, from \$5,100 to \$32,100.
