

Powerful New Light Lights Up One-Half Acre

You can light up one-half acre with just one powerful new Bosch "Kiruna" flood lamp mounted on your tractor or combine.

"It gives as much light as four sealed beams, yet draws fewer amps than one sealed beam," says Indiana farmer Paul Morris, of Versailles, who, after using the light on his own tractors and combine, started taking orders from neighbors.

"I tell farmers to try one and see for themselves. In almost every case, they're back within a week or two for additional lights to put on other tractors and combines," Morris told FARM SHOW. "Because of its low amperage, you eliminate burned out circuit breakers and other related wiring problems usually encountered with conventional sealed beams."

The Bosch "Kiruna" can be tied into the existing wiring, or you can run a separate wire. "If you do a lot of road work, I'd recommend wiring it separate so you can turn it off. It's too bright and will blind oncoming drivers if used on the road."

Fluted glass on the lamp directs the light pattern down, and out. "On a combine, one light will illuminate a pattern 75 ft. wide and 300 ft. long. As a rule of thumb, we suggest one light for each 13 ft. of



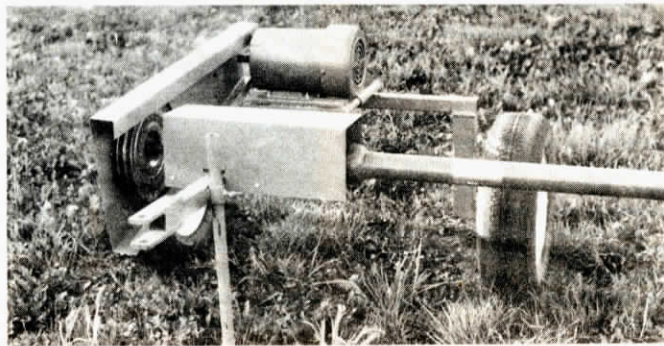
Paul Morris with 360° pivoting Bosch light.

header width. After combining, you can take the light off and use it for nighttime fall tillage. On tractors equipped with saddle tanks, the tanks often block the regular fender lights. The problem is easily solved by mounting a Bosch "Kiruna" up front," says Morris.

Mounting of the light can be upright, horizontal or suspended. Its pivoting base allows for 360° rotation, 8° forward tilt and 45° backward tilt.

Electric Pto Mounts On "Go Anywhere" Cart

"It frees a tractor for other uses and lets you automate operation of the auger feeding into your grain dryer," says Donald Olson, manufacturer of a "go anywhere" pto mounted on a cart and powered by an electric motor.

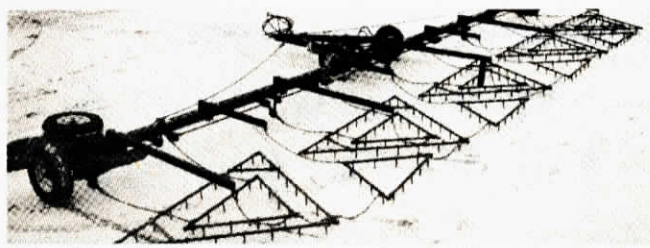
"You can wire the motor in with your grain dryer so they both automatically stop and start together. Plus, you can still power the auger with the tractor's pto if you're moving grain in an area where you don't have access to electricity," explains Olson, president of Bricelyn Mfg., Bricelyn, Minn.

His pto conversion cart, equipped with 540 rpm spline, is designed for use with a 10 hp electric motor. Olson notes that it'll handle augers as big as 8 in. in dia. and 60 ft. long.

It sells for \$492 and includes the 540 spline, a 12 in. double pulley and belts. You need to provide the electric motor and pto shaft.

GREAT FOR MINIMUM-TILL, IT'S BIG ENOUGH FOR THE PRAIRIES

"Crazy" 76-ft. Wide Free-Floating Harrow

Oscillating, free-floating harrows work well in heavy trash conditions but there hasn't been a unit available in a width of more than 30 ft. because of transport problems with the hard-to-fold units. Now Victory Equipment Ltd., Lethbridge, Alta., has broken the width barrier with their folding "Crazy Harrow" available in widths up to 76 ft.

Crazy Harrows are available in widths from 32 to 76 ft., all equipped with vibrating triangular sections tied to a heavy 6 by 6-in. toolbar.

"Unlike other oscillating harrows, the vibrating sections on this machine are driven by hydraulic-driven cranks rather than wheel-driven cranks so they can be regulated independently of the ground speed. This allows the operator to travel at high speeds without wearing out the equipment," says Ray Dyken,

president of Victory Equipment.

Each triangular section is 10 ft. wide in front with a smaller section in the middle. Another smaller section sits between each pair of sections pointing toward the front. All are connected by chains to orbit motor driven cranks that shake the sections as they move over the ground.

"They'll handle a tremendous amount of trash without plugging and are good at spreading straw," says Dyken.

The 32-ft., 54-ft. and 76-ft. models have 3, 5 and 7 sections respectively. The 32-ft. model sells for \$6,950 (Canadian).

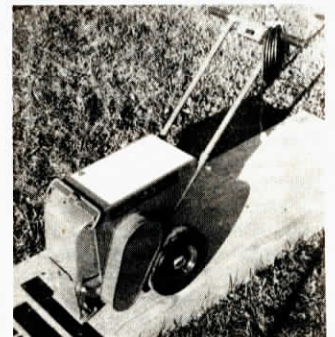
"Stripper" Peels Off Caked Manure

"This machine does in minutes what used to take us hours to do and with a lot less effort," says Lamont Campbell, Dundee, N.Y., farmer and distributor of the "Stripper", a machine that strips caked manure off hog nursery and growing pens.

The Stripper features a razor sharp blade mounted on the front of the unit that oscillates at 2,000 strokes a minute to slice through caked manure, up to 4 in. thick, in pens, alleyways and slats without hurting the floor.

Campbell explains that the machine was designed for industrial uses such as stripping turf, ice and carpeting. He's used the machine in his hog barns for the past eight months and says it works great for stripping caked hog manure.

The unit, looking like a push-type lawn mower, is powered by a ¾ hp. electric motor. It has 10 in. wheels and weighs 140 lbs. A 50 lb. weight is available for the front of the unit. Five

blades, ranging from 6 to 13 in. wide, are available.

The Stripper sells for \$790.
