BUYING TIPS YOU CAN USE

Randomly selected farmers "tell it like it is" in nominating their "best" and "worst" buys.

Mark Jacobs Associate Editor Charles Kubesh, Buffalo Lake, Minn.: "The hydraulic drive works great and quality of feed produced is excellent. But the rest of the mill is crudely designed," says Charles of his Lorenz grinder-mixer. "It dribbles out feed through several gaps while unloading or filling the mill. The brake on the infeed auger is a real knuckle-buster. The worst part of the mill is the unloading auger with its folding extension which folds over the top instead of the side like most other brands. There's no flange on the hinge joint, causing feed to pour out the crack while unloading. Also, the extra weight of the extension makes the auger too heavy for the brake to

As "best buy" Charles nominates his **Lester's** Insul-Wall farrowing barn. "Well insulated, rodent-proof, and quality workmanship. This company stands behind their warranty. My father also had good results with a machine shed purchased from Lester's."

it for \$25 and it hasn't given me any trouble since."

Boyd Smith, Alliance, Alb.: "I rate my 1983 GMC Sierra Classic with a 6.2 liter diesel engine as best buy. I have 50,000 km on it and has never been in for repairs. I get 27 mph with no load and 19 mpg with an 8-ft. camper. Has plenty of power and starts well in winter."

Paul Reinhardt, Okeana, Ohio: "The plows wouldn't plow cornstalks without first Bushhogging and disking the field," says Paul about his "worst buy" Deere 1450 plows.

He nominates his 1974 1066 International tractor as best buy. "It handles nice, has plenty of power and is a real pleasure to drive."

G.S. Town, Vermette, Man.: "Our World Tech satellite dish allows us to use the TV more and gives us more channels to choose from. It did need painting though because it's a goldspun aluminum dish and heat built up quite a bit."

Jon Christian, Duncan, Okl.: He's happy with his Motorola 2-way fm radios. "Our radios are used with a repeater which enables them to have a 50-mile radius from the repeater. They have an excellent range and save many miles and hours. They also make things run much smoother around the farm when unexpected breakdowns and problems arise."

Thomas S. Grilliot, Hutchinson, Kan.: "I used to replace guards every 1,500 acres. Now, with this sickle drive and new heavy-duty guards. I can cut over 2800 acres with just two new sickles and one set of guards," says Thomas about his "best buy" Farrar "Over Register" sickle drive installed on his 6600 self-propelled swather.

Tom Helzer, Sweet, Idaho: "Although my Deere 225 offset disk-harrow pulls hard, it really cuts through the stubble and leaves a good seedbed. It saves me a lot of field work because I don't plow anymore."

William Michael Jr., Billings, Mont.: "Our 1460 International Axial Flow combine is our best buy. Has tremendous capacity and functions very well."

Jack Fernau, Silex, Mo.: "This is the best fence-row and embankment cleaning tool money can buy. With the various cutting blades available, it can cut any kind of grass, weeds and brush with ease. To date, I've put 30 gal. of fuel mix through this unit and that's a lot of running for a 32 cc engine. No breakdowns and all I've had to do so far is adjust the spark plug once," says Jack, happy with his Stihl FS-90 AVE brush-cutter and trimmer.
