Mark Jacobs Associate Editor Kent Estes, Altoona, Kan.: "It really irritates me when manufacturers don't stand behind their products," says Kent, upset with his "worst buy" Acra-Plant "trash-whipper" furrow openers installed on his 7100 Max-Emerge planter. "They're supposed to be an improved version with notched discs and two bearings supporting each disc. The first year several bearings went out. The Deere furrow openers I owned before were on their fourth year before I ever lost a bearing. The only "whipping" these furrow openers do is in clean tilled fields. And, because they don't have any disc scrapers, dirt builds up and stops them from turning. Changing depth is supposed to be as easy as pulling a pin on the adjusting straps and slipping the opener up and down but the pins won't come out until the straps have been bent over with a large crescent wrench. I've called the company several times and always get the same old song and dance routine. My implement dealer has also called Acra-Plant. They always promise to get back to us. This has gone on for two years."

Harold Eason, Howell, Mich.:
"The automatic transmission has
never worked right. In cold weather, I

Leo's also pleased with his "best buy" International 1460 Axial Flow combine. "I've had this machine for seven years, harvesting about 6,000 acres. It's a dependable and hungry combine that does an excellent job in corn and soybeans. I never have to worry about dockage for foreign material."

Dennis Borowski, Glenavon, Sask.: "All I've had to replace is the turbo charger and radiator. The motor and transmission haven't been touched," comments Dennis happy with his 4630 Deere tractor with Power Shift transmission purchased used.

A strong wind can cover the floor with snow 10 ft. into the building.'
