Timon Heide, Grenora, N. Dak.: "Do you have to be a big operator to get service and warranty?" asks Timon. upset with his Deere 12-ft. solid wheel press drill. "The press wheels have split open time and time again. They've been welded and re-welded but were bad to start with. I've had to replace several at my own expense. I wrote to Deere and have approached the local dealer, but have received no compensation."

Donald Ellingson, Waukon, Iowa: "The designers of this stock feeder ring have devised the best automatic ear tag remover known to man," reports Donald, unhappy with his round bale feeder from Sioux Steel Co., Sioux Falls, S. Dak. "The open back design of the angled uprights snag the plastic ear tag or its button and break it or tear the tag from the ear. Our cows lost most of their tags last winter. Tags were always laying around the feeder."

Donald lists his last two new C-20 Chevrolet 4-WD pickups with automatic transmission as "best buys". "Since 1976 we have used Chevy

We have had this tractor a little over four years and it has given excellent service. Easy handling and excellent fuel economy. If I bought another new tractor it would be a Ford."

Donald Peterson, Langdon, N. Dak.: He's pleased with two "best buy" products. "I can't say enough about our 835 Versatile tractor. We've had no downtime. It's an excellent machine. The trucks are stock except for shocks, overloads, and a frame axle brace."
