Some cattle have a real dislike of horses or cowboys. These are the kind the helicopter rounds up in a couple of hours - like the 900 head on 12,000 acres done in 51/2 hours. They were in very thick mesquite tree brush and you'd have a tough time riding a horse through it, much less rounding up cattle in it. Something doesn't seem right in the articles about the hydrogen powered cars (Vol. 3, No. 4). Your article on page 3 indicates that 5 lbs. of hydrogen will operate the Omni car for 105 miles. This is 21 miles per lb. It also takes 35,000 watt-hours of electricity to produce a pound of hydrogen. This equals 1,670 watt-hours of electricity to generate enough hydrogen to power the Omni for a mile.

Then, on page 2, Kenny Green thinks the alternator, even an oversized one, will generate enough electricity to produce hydrogen to move a Ford LTD. Impossible! My Miller welder produces 5,000 watts, which if I run it for an hour, is 5,000 watt-hours of power. And I know how big that unit is. If the Ford runs at 50 mph, it will need 83,400 watt-hours of electricity from its alternator if it's as efficient as the Omni. An 83.4 kw generator under the hood?
