You wrote FARM SHOW a while back, asking for information on a new automatic silage feeding system which was featured in the May-June 1977 issue of FARM SHOW (Vol. 1 No. 3), but you didn't have your address on the letter and we weren't able to send you the address of the manufacturer of this popular new product. Here it is: Johansen Mfg., Loren Johansen, President, 17971 Ixonia Avenue W., Lakeville, Minn. 55044.

The Johansen automatic stall feeder teeds measured amounts of silage to each individual cow. It readily adapts to new or existing barns and can be preset to feed from 0 to about 2 bu. of silage per cow per feeding. For example, one cow can be fed 2 bu. of silage, the cow on her right 1 bu., and the cow on her left can be bypassed completely. Silage can be dispensed immediately after the feeder is filled. Or, the feeder can be "loaded" and a timer set to drop the feed automatically at a given time during the day or night.

I just love your magazine. It is such a shame I didn't know about it years earlier when my husband was alive. He would have used so many ideas and products in it. He is one of the first people in this area to use one man's ideas that you published. I am still interested in farming but am only involved indirectly now. Keep up the good work.
