Seed Pen Plants Small Seeds Fast

Wez Ligon says she would have appreciated her Seed Pen when she worked in the greenhouse at Michigan State University. The method then was to use a wet toothpick or tweezers to place tiny seeds in seed trays.

"The Seed Pen is like a magic marker with a "nib" at the end. It's filled with water and the nib lets water flow through," explains the Almont, Mich., inventor.

The seed sticks to the wet nib and releases when placed on another wet surface like moistened soil in seed trays or a wet seed tape.

"It's ideal for the home gardener or researcher," Ligon says. She uses the pen to start seeds in her own greenhouse and sells them through her Wez Products website for \$5.99

Ligon is also the inventor of spring clips used for building tool-free structures out of electrical conduit (Vol. 40, No.2).

mounted on tractor tires at the rear with a smaller swivel wheel on front.

Each is different, depending on what material Perrion had to work with. "I avoid buying new and keep costs down by using old iron," he says. "I have a wire welder that works fine after I grind away the rust."

Trimmer Plate Stops Grass From Wrapping

Glen Buxengard has the answer for grass wrapping around a trimmer shaft. His slotted cutter plate replaces the line cutting guard and solved a problem for Buxengard.

"I was cutting grass 12 to 14 in. high, and it would wind up around the shaft," he recalls. "I had to stop every 3 or 4 ft. to clean it away."

His solution was to cut a 5-in. dia. disc out of 1/8-in. steel with a hole in the center to match the mounting end of the shaft. He cut slots about halfway to the center and turned them up at the edges.

"When the long grass starts to wind, the slots cut it again," says Buxengard. "It prevents 99 percent of the grass from winding up on the shaft."

String Trimmer Fix Eliminates The Spool

"My new TrimmerFix eliminates both the spool and the 'skinny line' problems found on OEM string trimmer heads," says inventor Kenneth Oden. "It's designed for gas and electric trimmers that have removable spools and 2 holes in the bowl opposite each other. It uses .130 thick line that won't break."

He says the TrimmerFix is not for use on electric models with less than 6 amps. It sells for \$12.95 plus \$4.50 S&H within the U.S. "The price includes 25 ft. of Tuff line, which is good for more than 20 reloads," says Oden.
