Separate Fat From Hot Gravy, Soup

Here's a handy gadget for removing unwanted fats and oils from gravy, sauce or soup. It's called the Gravy-

Simple design is a key feature. A long spout reaches from the bottom of a 11/2 cup container. Hot liquid is poured into the container and allowed to sit for a minute or two until the fat separates from the rest of the liquid and floats to the top.

Next, the fat-free liquid is poured through the spout into a serving dish. The fat is left in the Gravy-Strain container and can be discarded.

A similar, large capacity model called the Souper-Strain holds up to 4 cups of soup stock or gravy. Both are made from Lexan plastic and are dishwasher safe. Standard and metric increments simplify measuring.

The Gravy-Strain sells for \$7, and the Souper-Strain for \$12.95.

Burying Valuables

Precious metals, money, or weapons and ammunition can be buried in the ground and preserved indefinitely in the "Cache It," a PVC cylindrical storage container that comes in a variety of sizes.

PVC is the same corrosion-proof material commonly used for underground water pipelines, according to Eldon Morgan, general manager of the retail division of S.I. Equipment, Carson, Cal. manufacturer of the "Cache It." He notes that the container seals tightly and lets in no moisture or air. It does not rust or collect minerals

Two types of containers are offered, the most popular being the reusable one, which can be opened, the contents checked, and the unit resealed. One end of the pipe-like unit has a permanent cap, sealed on at the factory. The other end has a cap that the user puts on, using plumber's pipe thread compound to seal the cap. A lower-cost model seals on both ends for burial. It then has to be broken to be opened.

The 2 by 12 in. reusable model sells for \$18.50, plus shipping. A 6 by 48 in. reusable model sells for \$75, plus shipping. There are four models between the 2 by 12 in. and the 6 by 48 in, models.

Information sheets are supplied, which suggest good places to hide

the "Cache It". For example, says Morgan, if you want to bury something metal, which a metal detector would be drawn to, bury the unit under a water pipe. Or, bury it a couple of feet below some buried scrap metal. A person operating a metal detector probably would stop at the scrap metal and dig no further.

The PVC walls of the unit are about 3/16 in. thick.

Aunt Grace's used to be advertised around Atlanta as being "capable of removing almost anything (blood, lipstick, doggie stains, etc.) not only from your carpet but also from your laundry, your windshield and even you hair.'

The recent announcement to remanufacture Aunt Grace's brought orders from across the country and from abroad. "We've had orders from Ohio, California, Arizona, Colorado, and Canada. Just the other day we

received an order and a check from Oslo, Norway," Pomeranz told FARM SHOW two weeks ago.

Rich's is selling the concentrate in 48 oz. tubes for \$29.99. Shipping charges are extra. Pomeranz says just 6 oz. diluted in water should clean four 9-ft. by 12-ft. rugs.

Incidentally, there really is an Aunt Grace. She's inventor Ware's wife and he named the product after her.
